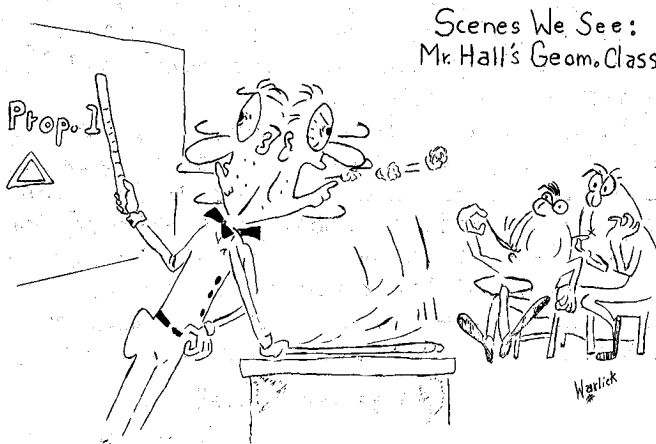

BOYS' BASKETBALL

After getting off to a rather slow start in region play, the College Park boys' basketball team then shot their way to seven straight region wins. In this streak; Douglas County, Hapeville, Headland, Gainesville, Newnan, Smyrna, and Westminster were the teams who succumbed to the better shooting of College Park.

Exciting moments during these seven games included the stubbornness of both Headland and Newnan who lost by only 54-50 and 55-51 scores. There were also two dramatic triumphs, both here at the City Auditorium. In the first, Gainesville lasted for four quarters and two overtimes before losing 49-47. In the second, it took two foul shots by Charles Akins in the last few seconds of play to beat an inspired Smyrna team, 47-46.

In the College Park-Fairburn game on January 21, Fairburn finally pulled away in the last five minutes on foul shots to beat us 48-38. This loss left the Rams with an 8-2 region re-

cord while Fairburn now stands 9-0.

Although Jimmy Tumlin is high scorer for the Rams, he has received plenty of shooting help from Richard Stevens, Charles Akins, Tommy Fields, Bobby Piephoff, Riley Nix and Jack Bell.

The Third Region Music Festival was held at West Georgia College in Carrollton, Georgia on February 25-28.

The orchestra presented "Andante" composed by Haydn, "Waltz of The Flowers" by Tschai-kowsky, and "Bourree" from Watermusic Suite by Handel.

Choruses are classified according to enrollment. CPHS is classified as BB.

Each chorus is required to sing two numbers of which one must be unaccompanied. Our selections were "Cantate Domino" by Pitoni and "A Dream Within A Dream" by Cross.

Aside from the experience of singing before judges, one of the chief values of the festival is getting to hear other groups sing.

College Park is about to take part in a special county wide health drive stressing cancer and tuberculosis. eases February 20. Dr. Hopkins is also arranging for \$350 to be awarded to the school in Fulton County with the best program on this subject. Second prize is \$150. The drive will end on May 10. College Park plans to make this an entire school project. It is hoped that from the information gained in this drive students will have the facts in their minds when they make their own decision.

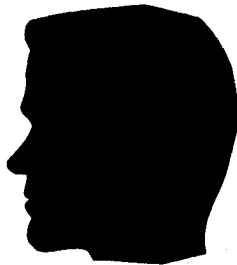
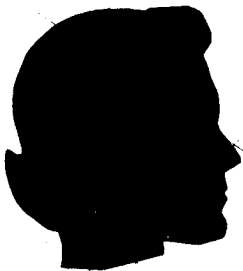
