Thirty-five Georgia schools are eligible to attend the Georgia Junior Classical League Convention at College Park on April 25 and 26. Each school is allowed two official delegates who will be housed overnight, but more representatives will attend the Roman banquet and the skit program on Friday night.

The program for the convention on Friday includes registration of delegates, a display of College Park projects, a Roman banquet, a costume contest to be judged at the banquet, and program of skits put on by the various chapters. On Saturday there will be a morning business meeting preceded by a mythology contest and the judges reports on all the contests. A light lunch given by the College Park club will follow as a farewell gesture to our guests.

At the banquet over three hundred Roman costumed guests will be served by slaves, a seven course meal from fruit to nuts. Entertainment will be provided between each course by gladiators, wrestlers, and dancers, girls from the physical education department.
